
### **ROUND 2 DEBATING**
















### Year 5 "Gold Day"

YEAR 4 – STEM EXPERIENCES

On Friday last week, 4B and 4Y went down to the beach and made their very own rainbow serpent. Each student made a group and picked a part of the snake and designed it based on different song lines from different Aboriginal groups and ways they live and learn which led us to build our own rainbow serpent. My group made a big base of the serpent then we decorated it with sand shaped like flowers and spikes to make it more like a snake. Then we all flattened the area around the snake. That's what we have been doing in STEM for the last couple of months.

4B & 4Y went down to Umina beach on Friday and made a big sand snake. This was inspired by the rainbow snake Aboriginal dreamtime story. 4B and 4Y paired up in groups of four to make different parts of the snake and as you looked at all the parts of the snake it told different song lines. We have been learning about Aboriginal technology in STEM activities. We have learned about Aboriginal Firestick Farming. Firestick Farming had a big impact on living back then such as burning the outback to stop possible future bush fires spreading, scaring the animals by the fire smoke so that all the people could be on the lookout for a good time to spear them and is a big advantage to hunting their meals. Once all the fires are put out new underground green shoots will freshly grow and new plants grow which provides food for Aboriginal people.

On Friday 4B and 4Y went to Umina Beach and built the Rainbow serpent out of sand. Each group of about 4 people had their own section to build on the snake and design or decorate with patterns. The Rainbow serpent story started in Arnhem Land and spread across nations in Australia.

In STEM we've been learning about Aboriginal plants one of the plants we learnt about was a native plant to Australia called the Banksia and the Banksia's scientific name is Integrifolia. In South Western Australia there are 60 different species recorded in that area. The Banksia likes to come out to flower in the late summer and all through winter.

Another plant we've learnt about in STEM is Warrigal greens. The Warrigal greens' scientific name is Tetragonia tetragonioides and Warrigal greens mainly grow along the eastern coastline. That's what year 4 have been learning about in STEM.

We were told to make the rainbow snake out of sand and the things our teachers brought with us. When we read the book, it told us about how the rainbow snake came to be. It also told us about how the people from this Aboriginal nation were forced to work by European people. That's when the rainbow snake came from the sky.

It was really angry and the snake travelled to different places. I think one was Western Australia. Still many Aboriginal people all over Australia have their own stories and the story of the snake, some are different, some are similar.

We had a 'wild' night at the P&C Disco last week! Thank you to our wonderful teachers who volunteered their time and of course our super P&C team for making this event such a success!
