



HPGE MATHS EXCURSION TO BWSC UMINA

DON'T FORGET TO HAND IN YOUR FREE DENTAL CHECK FORMS

NSW Health Primary School Dental Program

NSW Health is working with the Department of Education and public primary schools to offer free dental check-ups and preventive care, to all students as part of a school-based mobile dental program. Our school has been selected to participate the program.

Many parents may not realise two important things about their children's teeth:

- 1. Good oral health is essential for children to successfully learn and participate at school, and
- 2. NSW Health offers free public dental health services to all children under 18 years of age.

Learning and behaviour difficulties at school can start with tooth and gum problems. That's because decay and gum disease can cause pain and difficulties in eating, sleeping, talking, concentrating, and learning, which can in turn affect a child's behaviour in class. A child with tooth decay may feel self-conscious about the way their teeth look and feel, making it harder for them to join in class and social activities.


Our school is participating in the program and offering students the opportunity to have free dental check-ups in a comfortable and familiar environment at school. With a parent/carers consent, students are able to have a free dental check-up and free preventive care.

The Life Of A Teacher

The following articles are about the funny and interesting experiences I have had as a teacher at Umina Beach Public School over the years.

I want to make the point that these are all true stories.

I'll start with this one.

"My Dad Died"


I was teaching Year 2 and it was about 5 weeks into the first term. The kids were getting used to the routine of the class, one of which was "Sentence a Day", where the students were given some theme words and a topic and were expected to write a sentence about that.

On this day, I'd told the kids that unlike the previous week or two where I'd been providing an example on the board that they had the option to copy, they'd have to create the sentence themselves. The theme was "proper nouns" and to help them the words "Sydney, Brisbane, Toyota and Mazda" where written on the

board. I also gave them a time limit, as I wanted them to get used to the idea of "Sentence a Day being a quick 5-10 minute activity.

At the end of the time, I got the kids to bring their books to me and then to sit on the floor so they could do "News", whilst I checked their books. Things were going along smoothly, the kids where settled and listening to each other's news, whilst I went through their books, occasionally calling up a student to explain an error. I then got to one boy's book which had the sentence "My dad died".

Well, that pulled me up quick. I reread it and the last word was a bit messy and squashed, but it definitely looked like "died". Check for yourself:



You might already know that teachers become very adept at interpreting the writing of young students and even with all my years of experience I couldn't work out an alternative to the word "died". I then started to think about the significance of it. As teacher's we are informed of any significant events that have occurred in a student's life so we can understand our students. I hadn't read or heard anywhere that this boy's dad was dead. Then the thought struck me that what if I had inadvertently brought up this horrible memory because his dad was in a Toyota or Mazda or driving from Sydney to Brisbane when he died? I took a moment to think how to proceed and then I asked the boy to come up to me and I pointed to his sentence and said "Is this true?" to which he responded "No it should be 'My dad drived to Brisbane.', but I runned out of time to write it."

Kids At Their Best

This next story happened on a Year 2 class also. I had a boy in my class who had a condition called "dyspraxia". Now there are a number of versions of this condition, he had two of them. He had it with hearing so although he could hear sounds fine, the words someone spoke to him would become all mixed up as he tried to comprehend them. As if that wasn't enough for him to cope with, he also had dyspraxia with his speech which meant his speech came out jumbled up. When he spoke he sounded almost like someone who is deaf where they don't quite finish each word in a clear way.

Now being the game little fellow he was, that didn't stop him from wanting to participate in "News".

He'd get up in front of the class most weeks and he'd attempt to tell the class his news. Sometimes he'd have a toy or some object that the other kids could see what he was talking about, but sometimes he didn't. Either way the kids would quietly listen as this young champion said something that I could never understand, before finishing his talk with: "Quere (rhyming with hair) Com".) Now the rest of the class knew that when he got to "Quere Com" that stood for "Are there any Questions or Comments".

Every week without fail, other kids in the class would ask a question, with the response being something that I don't think the kids could understand (I certainly couldn't!). But that would not stop another kid from asking another question. And what makes this such a beautiful thing, is that the kids weren't going out of their way "to be inclusive", they were just being themselves. It's moments like these that kept me teaching for so long.

OK this is from a few years ago and yes it's from another Year 2 class! Little kids are so innocent and what they say and do can be just so memorable!

"The Overseas Trip"

At the very start of most years, the teacher's take the kids they had the previous year for about an hour before forming the new classes while the office staff check on who has returned and who hasn't. I decided to do a little activity about where the kids went for their holidays. One of the reasons I did this is because I knew that one of my little girls had gone to Sri Lanka to visit her family and I thought it would be interesting for the kids to hear about her trip. So, I started by getting all the kids to stand. Then I said "If the furthest you went in the holidays was just around Umina, sit down". I then worked through different categories until it got to be just the kids who had gone overseas that where standing. Now obviously the girl I mentioned was left standing but also standing was a boy, which surprised me, because even though he was a really nice little fellow (though he could be a bit vague), his mum had recently had a baby and I didn't think the family would be up to traveling overseas yet. However, I tried not to judge, so I said to him. "Wow, so you went overseas in the holidays?"

He nodded his head.

"So where did you go?"

He answered, "I went fishing."

Trying to stop myself (and some of my other kids) from laughing, I quickly got him to sit and asked the girl to tell about her holiday to Sri Lanka.

"The Best..."


This true story is from just a couple of years ago (these students are still at school and might be able to figure out who it is I'm talking about!) The students were set a writing assessment with the topic being "The best..." with the children being able to choose whatever their favourite thing is.

Now being a Year 2 class, I gave them some ideas for their writing, such as it could have been "The best food", "best colour", "best animal", "best toy" etc. You might be able to imagine my astonishment when not only one, but two of my 8 year old students wrote about "The best element on the periodic table! With one of them writing about Magnesium and including details about how it burns underwater and it being a heavy element according to its atomic weight and the other student choosing an unstable radioactive element that I'd never heard of -"Neptunium!"

Test Answers

I've had some very interesting written responses from students over the years. Here's a couple:

- From a year 4 maths test. The question: Draw three different angles. One student did three drawings of stick figures, each with a different facial expression and each with wings and a halo.
- From another maths test: I'll let the photo explain. The second sentence in the question is the key.


